

Did St Thomas take Christianity to India?

So Jesus *did* speak with the Greeks.


If you follow the world map of where Greek was spoken it closely relates to the spread of Christianity.

According to traditional accounts of Saint Thomas by Christians of modern-day Kerala in India, Saint Thomas travelled outside the Roman Empire to preach the Gospel, travelling as far as the Tamilakam which is in South India, and reached Muziris in Tamilakam, modern-day North Paravur and Kodungalloor in Kerala State, India in AD 52. (see Johnson, Lynn; Zacharia, Paul, 19 February 2016) and "The Surprisingly Early History of Christianity in India". Smithsonian Magazine.

In 1258, some of the relics were brought to Ortona, in Abruzzo, Italy, (see "Co-Cathedral Basilica of St. Thomas the Apostle". GCatholic.org.) where they have been held in the Church of Saint Thomas the Apostle. He is regarded as the patron saint of India among its Christian adherents, and the Feast of Saint Thomas on July 3rd is celebrated as Indian Christians' Day. The name Thomas remains quite popular among the Saint Thomas Christians of the Indian subcontinent.
